

# NUDE FOOD DAY

On Thursday 29th of October St Mary's celebrated **National Nude Food Day.** Our students joined other students around the nation in bringing healthy, wrapper free lunches to school . Nude Food Day is a chance for our students to realise what they can do for their health and the health of the planet.



## What is Nude Food?

**Nude Food** is simply food that is not wrapped in foil, plastic or commercial packaging. The best type of nude food consists mainly of fresh food, so that it is healthy and nutritious PLUS environmentally friendly.

Promoting Nude Food empowers students to make conscious choices about what they eat, and encourages them to think about their impact on the environment (and their health). You might be amazed with how enthused your child can become on this...

Throughout the year, St Mary's School designates each Thursday as Nude Food Day. We encourage students to bring Nude Food to **eat well** and **live well**, and eliminate all unnecessary packaging and wrapping that goes into rubbish bins and ultimately landfill. Many families have embraced this idea and have Nude Food every day.

## Tips for Packing Nude Food Lunches:

- Try to involve the kids in helping decide what to take. This will help to avoid uneaten foods being thrown out, plus will save your family money as well.
- Try to pack the lunches the night before and store in the fridge overnight to avoid the mad rush in the morning
- If your child normally enjoys chips, yoghurt or other pre-packaged snacks, buy these in a larger format and you can decant these into smaller reusable containers or lunchbox.
- If your child does enjoy chips, why not try making your own vegie versions using sliced beetroot, parsnip or sweet potato and baking in the oven?
- Try to use fruit and vegetables that are in season. Seasonal produce is friendly to the environment as well as to your budget, as less fuels are used to transport it into your supermarket.

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### "The Year of Mercy"



Pope Francis will soon inaugurate the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy. In the first few paragraphs of his official letter he writes:

1. Jesus Christ is the face of the Father's mercy. Mercy has become living and visible in Jesus of Nazareth ... 'merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness' (Exodus 34:6). ... Jesus of Nazareth, by his words, his actions, and his entire person reveals the mercy of God. 2. We need constantly to contemplate the mystery of

mercy. It is a wellspring of joy, serenity and peace. Our salvation depends on it. Mercy: the word reveals the very mystery of the Most Holy Trinity. Mercy: the ultimate and supreme act by which God comes to meet us. Mercy: the fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person who looks sincerely into the eyes of his brothers and sisters on the path of life. Mercy: the bridge that connects God and humans, opening our hearts to the hope of being loved forever despite our sinfulness.

At times we are called to gaze even more attentively on mercy so that we may become a 3. more effective sign of the Father's action in our lives. For this reason I have proclaimed an Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy as a special time for the Church, a time when the witness of believers might grow stronger and more effective.

The Latin title Misericordiae Vultus is taken form the first line of the Letter - 'the face of mercy'. Read the text of the Pope's letter at the Vatican site. ost letters/do nts/papa-francesco bolla 20150411 mis




The document is 16 pages long, and has 25 paragraphs. There are sections on: the Holy Door; Mercy in the Psalms; the Parables of Mercy;

Mercy in the Church;

the encyclical on Mercy by John Paul II; Pilgrimage in a Holy Year:

the motto 'Merciful like the Father'; the spiritual and corporal works of mercy;

mercy in the gospel of Luke; the season of Lent; 24 hours Tues 17 Nov for the Lord.



Church: that of the Son having taken upon His shoulders the lost soul, demonstrating that it is Christ's love that brings to completion the mystery of His incarnation culminating in redemption. The logo has been designed to express the profound way in which the Good

Shepherd touches the flesh of humanity and does so with a love that has the power to change one's life. One particular feature worthy of note is that while the Good Shepherd, in His great mercy, takes humanity upon Himself, His eyes are merged with those of man. Christ sees with the eyes of Adam, and Adam with the eyes of Christ. Every person discovers in Christ, the new Adam, his or her own humanity and the future that lies ahead. The scene is enclosed in a mandorla, an element typical of ancient and medieval iconography that

recalls the two natures, divine and human, in Christ. The three concentric ovals, with colours that get lighter as we move outward, suggest the movement of Christ Who carries humanity out of the darkness of sin and death. Conversely, the depth of the darker colour suggests the impenetrability of the love of the Father Who forgives all.

### **Coming Feast days**

1 November All Saints The earliest certain observance of a feast in honour of all the saints is an early fourth-century commemoration of "all the martyrs." In the early seventh century, after successive waves of invaders plundered the catacombs, Pope Boniface IV gathered up some 28 wagonloads of bones and reinterred them beneath the Pantheon, a Roman temple dedicated to all the gods. The pope rededicated the shrine as a Christian church. According to Venerable Bede, the pope intended "that the memory of all the saints might in the future be honoured in the place which had formerly been dedicated to the worship not of gods but of demons" (On the Calculation of Time). But the rededication of the Pantheon, like the earlier commemoration of all the martyrs, occurred in May. Many Eastern Churches still honour all the saints in the spring, either during the Easter season or immediately after Pentecost.

How the Western Church came to celebrate this feast, now recognized as a solemnity, in November is a puzzle to historians. The Anglo-Saxon theologian Alcuin observed the feast on November 1 in 800, as did his friend Arno, Bishop of Salzburg. Rome finally adopted that date in the

ninth This feast first honoured martyrs. Later, when Christians were free to worship according to their consciences, the Church acknowledged other paths to sanctity. In the early centuries the only criterion was popular acclaim, even when the bishop's approval became the final step in placing a commemoration on the calendar. The first papal canonization occurred in 993; the lengthy process now required to prove extraordinary sanctity took form in the last 500 years. ### 2 November All Souls

On the day following the feast of All Saints, we remember those who have not yet achieved the goal of their pilgrimage, the Kingdom of Heaven.

The feast of All Souls developed alongside the feast of All Saints. The Church has always encouraged prayers for the faithful departed. In the early years, a list of the names of the dead was placed in the church so that the community would remember them in prayer. In the 6<sup>th</sup> century, Benedictine monasteries held a solemn commemoration of their deceased members on the day after Pentecost. Similar services soon came to be held in other religious communities.

In the first half of the 11<sup>th</sup> century. St Odilo of Cluny decreed that the Office of the Dead was to be offered for all the souls in purgatory in all monasteries of the order on November 2<sup>nd</sup>, the day after

All Saints. Other orders followed this custom, and soon November 2<sup>nd</sup> was adopted as the feast of All Souls for the whole Church

On All Souls we pray in unity for our deceased relatives and friends and for those who have no one to pray for them. http://liturgybrisbane.net.au/liturgylines/all-souls/

Most Catholics think of St. Peter's as the pope's main church, but St. John Lateran is the pope's church, the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome where the Bishop of Rome presides. The first basilica on the site was built in the fourth century when Constantine donated land he had received from the wealthy Lateran family. That structure and its successors suffered fire, earthquake and the ravages of war, but the Lateran remained the church where popes were consecrated until the popes returned from Avignon in the 14th century to find the church and the adjoining palace in ruins.

Pope Innocent X commissioned the present structure in 1646. One of Rome's most imposing churches, the Lateran's towering facade is crowned with 15 colossal statues - of Christ, John the Baptist, John the Evangelist and 12 doctors of the Church. St Martin of Tours, bishop

St Martin of Iours, bishop A story of St Martin On a bitterly cold day, a famous legend goes, Martin met a poor man, almost naked, trembling in the cold and begging from passers-by at the city gate. Martin had nothing but his weapons and his clothes. He drew his sword, cut his cloak into two pieces, gave one to the beggar and wrapped himself in the other half. Some of the bystanders laughed at his now odd appearance; others were ashamed at not having relieved vysamiums i suppred at ms now odd appearance; others were ashamed at not having relieved the man's misery. That night in his sleep Martin saw Christ dressed in the half of the gammen he had given away, and heard him say, "Martin, still a catechumen, has covered me with his comment."
