BEHAVIOUR EXPECTATIONs / NORMS for Learning in the home ¹

Purpose:

To create a table of *specific positive (desired) behaviours* based on your child / children's school rules, continuing school's efforts to teach pro-social behaviours particularly around learning in the home.

<u>Tips</u>
Create a table listing the school rules down the side and different contexts across the top – see below.

- ◆ Together with your child / children put *short examples* of what the rule "looks like" for that time / activity (e.g. follow directions...) in each box. What behaviours you expect to see if your child/children are being respectful safe responsible? Observable behaviours that demonstrate the rules will bring them to life.
- ♠ Avoid the words "don't" and "not" try to state the behaviour expectations positively: what TO DO, not what NOT to do! e.g. Put your towel on the rack NOT Don't leave your towel on the floor.
- ♦ Put these behaviour expectations (norms) in a couple of places your child/children can see them e.g. fridge door, near their learning space....
- ♦ Remind your child/children of the behaviour expectations (norms) for each area. Initially frequently reward your child/children showing the expected behaviours.
